What's new in
Telepodiatry? We began
introducing Telepodiatry last spring.
Telepodiatry is the same concept as
Telehealth, which has revolutionized
medicine. Telepodiatry allows
podiatrists to remain in their offices
while they treat patients who are in
another medical office, sometimes
hundreds of miles away.

After months recruiting podiatrists, we began our pilot program in the fall, 2017. This month we received a wonderful "Thank You" letter for our efforts. More importantly, the generous and talented Dr. Kathleen Newport was recognized for her work. Dr. Newport practices podiatry in North Carolina and volunteers her services using Telepodiatry at the Health Wagon, in rural Wise County, Virginia.

You may recognize the HealthWagon name. They coordinate the largest free medical event in the United States, Remote Area Medical, RAM.

Medical personnel provides probono assistance to the community. Patients line up days in advance so they can receive medical, dental and vision treatment. RAM has been in effect since 2000, and they have never had a podiatrist participate.



One of our 2017 goals was to recruit a podiatrist to participate in RAM, and Dr. Claudia Sands answered the call. Dr. Sands is a gifted podiatrist, and we are very grateful for her giving heart. The Health Wagon team was thrilled to have her join them last year, and they look forward to working with her again this year.

We'll bring you more about our Telepodiatry efforts in 2018. There is a great need for podiatry services at Free Clinics, and Telepodiatry can help meet that need.
